What do you do in your free time?


I have two children so do lots of family things, we often go to the cinema. We love watching Marvel films.

What is your book?


I love the boy at the back of the classroom as it is about finding belonging and welcoming others.

Please find a recap of information shared with parents around the No Outsiders project within school. We hope to be to share with you lots of examples of our learning about this throughout the rest of the year and beyond,




As part of an ongoing focus on ensuring that every member of our school community is welcome and feels a sense of belonging we will be introducing the "No Outsiders" approach which aims to tackle themes such as racism, homophobia and other mindsets that encourage the othering of people within our school. Our whole school assembly used the text "Here we are" to help discuss the incredible diversity of our universe, and the fact that it is ok to ask questions about things you don't know. We also looked at some racist graffiti (below) which went viral online when someone in the local community added all the languages spoken within the area. We shared this with the students and discussed how someone had turned a negative message into a positive inclusive one and the reasons why someone may have written the message to begin with.



Our aim is to ensure pupils understand why people may act in this way and prepare them for a life in the 21st century.




The "No Outsiders" approach links books with key themes and topics, and this term we will be looking at those which address racism. Across the school we will be looking at the texts below, with lessons planned around them, along with follow up activities to create displays throughout the school promoting a sense of belonging and that all are welcome. We plan to host another "No Outsiders" focus this academic year and will continue to embed this approach in our curriculum, with more dedicated time in the future.
